When Jesus says I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full, he doesn't say that means it will be without suffering. Fullness of life speaks of joy, hope and resurrection, but life in all its fullness is not life without pain or disappointment: Jesus's own life wasn't. The pandemic has been a storm unlike anything we have experienced before. As we have faced illness, bereavement, mental health challenges and radical change, all of us have been affected by events we couldn't control.

That doesn't mean we can't, even now, live life in all its fullness. God accompanies us through a life in which we live both in the startling light of the resurrection and yet remain intensely aware of Jesus's cry from the cross 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' still resonating throughout creation, and sometimes in our own lives. Life in its fullness, he says, is not life without tears, but life with the one who dries our tears and moves us on to fresh pastures.

Drawing on many years of experience of working with people with mental health challenges, **John Swinton** will be in conversation with **Paula Gooder** about how we can all live life faithfully and to the full, and take care of our mental and spiritual health, even in the face of uncertainty, loss and change.

John Swinton is Professor of Practical Theology and Pastoral Care at the University of Aberdeen and Founding Director of Aberdeen's Centre for Spirituality, Health and Disability. Life holds many mysteries and unanswered questions. This year more than ever, many of us have wondered where life's meaning lies. The questions the Psalmists asked thousands of years ago have become our own: How long? Why? Where are you, God?

At the beginning of the Gospel of John, the writer claims that the answer to the deepest mysteries of our lives and of the entire cosmos is not a philosophical idea or a scientific explanation, but a person. Jesus of Nazareth, the controversial rabbi who 2,000 years ago had a brief public career teaching and healing before being killed by the Roman authorities, is in himself, his life and his actions, his death and resurrection, the unveiling of the mystery at the heart of the universe. He is the life that breathes through each of us and the light that fills each day. He shows us the passionate, permanent love of God. For Christians, this is the heart of our faith.

Yet this strange revelation does not give us neat answers, but asks us into relationship with the mystery. As we begin Lent after an unprecedented year of change and uncertainty, **Sarah Mullally** and **Paula Gooder** will be in conversation about the love of Christ, what it means to be part of the body of Christ, and how we can draw closer to Christ this Lent.

Don MacGregor will give a series of short talks on the day, tieing together various aspects of science and spirituality, particularly focussing on the strange thing that we all know we have, but no one knows what it is — consciousness. From both a scientific and a spiritual perspective, consciousness can give us a path to understanding more of the physical and metaphysical nature of the universe in which we live. In the first half, he will first look at what the science says about Oneness, then draw on the spiritual heritage to illustrate the convergence with scientific viewpoints. In the second half, he will look in more detail about the power of our thoughts, prayers and actions, and the implications for the significance of the life of Jesus the Christ.

Revd **Don MacGregor** is a retired Anglican Priest living in St David's, West Wales. He has also been a science teacher. His first book, **'Blue Sky God: the Evolution of Science and Christianity'**, arises out of his reflections on the way forward for science and Christianity in the 21st century.
